ORCHESTRA EXTRA CREDIT OPPORTUNITIES

- Opportunities to boost your grade!
- * Raise your grade as much as 10% per semester!

1. Attend a concert and fill out a LISTENING REVIEW form.

This can be any type of concert that includes <u>live</u> music: classical, pop, rock, band, choir, orchestra, musical, etc. You do NOT need to turn in a program. Print the LISTENING REVIEW form or see Ms. Duce for the form. **ADDS UP TO 3% TO YOUR GRADE.**

2. Write a poem about music.

This assignment can be completed only twice per semester.

ADDS UP TO 2% TO YOUR GRADE.

3. Do a one-page report on a composer's life.

See specific requirements on page 2 of this document. Report must be written as a paragraph(s).

ADDS UP TO 3% TO YOUR GRADE.

4. Look up a strings web site and do a summary about it.

See specific requirements on page 2 of this document. Summary must be written as a paragraph(s).

HINT: Search a music word, group, or artist, such as "violin" or "Phoenix Symphony"

ADDS UP TO 3% TO YOUR GRADE.

5. Participate in a non-school musical performance outside of class.

Complete the **SPECIAL EVENT PARTICIPATION** form. You do not need to turn in a program. If you participate in a performance on a secondary instrument (not your orchestra instrument), some credit will still be given. **ADDS UP TO 3% TO YOUR GRADE.**

6. Make an appointment with Ms. Duce to play scales.

Scales must be memorized and played at quarter note = 60 on a metronome.

Students should only make an appointment when they are completely prepared to play each scale.

THREE SCALES PLAYED CORRECTLY ADDS 2% TO YOUR GRADE.

7. Learn a piece with a friend or friends and perform in class.

This can be a duet, trio, quartet, etc. Each student is responsible for learning his/her own part and no two students can play the same part. Students are responsible for finding their own music. Student(s) need to get Ms. Duce's approval before learning & performing a piece. A piece learned in orchestra can not be used for this assignment.

- 7. Highlight (share a little information about) ONE of the most popular pieces that the composer wrote.
- 8. Is there anything interesting that we should know about the composer's personal life? (Was the composer married, did he have kids, did the composer suffer from illness, etc.?)
- 9. What pieces do you know or have you played that this composer wrote?
